We don't want to give too much away about the story, but there are two books one about a dog and another about a cat, who experience something similar to the adoption process here at Bide Awhile.

The first lucky few to receive copies of the books were organizations such as the Halifax Public Libraries, and libraries within the Halifax Regional School Board.

From there, avid readers who take part in Bide Awhile's Reading Circle will each receive copies of the books while they read to our pets, building their skills and self-confidence.

Bide Awhile lending a hand to Hants County's 9-Lives Cat Rescue

Sometimes the best way to make a difference is by lending a hand to an organization that does it best.

Where Bide Awhile is an active proponent of spaying and neutering pets to alleviate the issue of pet over-population, 9-Lives Cat Rescue, also actively promotes spaying and neutering, but works more directly with stray and feral cats by trapping, spaying or neutering them, then releasing them in their habitat (Trap, Neuter, Return, or TNR).

For years now, 9-Lives Cat Rescue, a CRA-registered charity based in Hants County, has been doing this work, and recently put out a call for donations to help purchase a number of squish cages.

Squish cages are a type of cage that humanely traps stray or feral cats to be spayed or neutered, then returned. The cages help ensure the cats - and the humans - aren't harmed in the TNR process.

As their work aligns with our mission and values, to support them, Bide Awhile answered their call by purchasing ten squish cages to help them continue their excellent work. We will be presenting the cages in the near future. Visit 9-lives.ca for information.

Joseph knew he could no longer live on his own, but couldn't imagine moving if he was not allowed to take his cat. So, I promised him, when the time came, I would take the cat at Bide Awhile.

But that didn't solve Joseph's problem entirely - he wanted to maintain some kind of contact with this cat, because, if the cat was adopted, how could he know if it was doing OK? In most cases, he couldn't have known.

It was arranged that he could come to our shelter and visit the cat every week, and, to no surprise,

he came regularly, regardless of the weather.

Soon enough, the day came when I had to tell Joseph I found a home for the cat. While he was happy his cat found a new home, he was heartbroken that he may

We arranged for one of our volunteers to visit him with Bud, our then-shelter cat, who was well-known to Joseph because of his regular visits to the shelter. Those were happy times and lifted his spirits greatly.

This is just one story about a man and his cat and how they both needed each other at different times in their lives. I could fill a book with stories of how cats and dogs have helped people.

Quattro came into the shelter when she was only six weeks old with seven other kittens in her litter.

Her hind legs were very weak and went whichever direction they wanted, making her the smallest and most dirty out of her siblings. Quattro also had to struggle to get a chance to eat, and at minimum, she was being bathed four times a day. That's when I decided to take her home on my days off to monitor her and eliminate the risk of faecal scald.

My entire household quickly fell in love with her, and she became part of the family. Then, at ten-weeks-old, she lost the ability to control her bladder and bowels - which is very common for an animal in her condition. I learned how to express/stimulate her on my own.

At first, all five vets who had seen her believed it was spina bifida, when, in fact, it was three hemivertebrae in the thoracic region of her spine causing issues. This is a genetic disorder she was born with, and despite the limited use of her hind legs, she has gained muscle and shown hopeful improvements with each vet visit.

Quattro is not in pain and will be able to grow and live a happy life. She's a great little kitten who loves playtime, cuddles, and eating like a piggy. She enjoys hanging out with her two dog brothers and is very interested in the kitties who also came from Bide Awhile.

Here's an idea of where your valuable fundraising dollars go. It costs, on average:

- \$350 to get one animal ready for adoption, including spay/neuter, feline leukemia testing, deworming, up-to-date vaccinations and more
- \$450 each month to provide litter for our cats
- \$1,750 to care for a mother and newborn kittens, and prepare them for the adoption process.
